Hello all the missing! That is the new keyword or phrase these days... The last couple of months we have been looking at the posting in the Usher's Room of those attending the Sunday morning Masses. This past Breakfast asked if they could help... As the Worthy GK recently Sunday, the number of people attending the 7:30, 9:00 and 10:30 masses were 173, 337, and 302, respectively. The corresponding numbers of people coming to the Breakfast were 36, 67 and 59. So for all (?) the people attending Mass, 20% of them came to Breakfast. The same number of 20% that came to the January Breakfast. Now, I want LOTS of people to eat afterwards and fill their bellies and our coffers... but that is not the real

We will be putting out the flyers on February 24th and collecting them on March 2nd. Our goal is to



collect 2,00 pounds of food and sundries to give to the Crystal Lake Food Panty so they can better serve their clients. If you happen to get a flyer, please participate to help others in our community.

The Pack had their Pinewood Derby at the end of January and each of the top two winners in rank class are headed to Rockford's Cherryvale Mall on April 13^{th} and 14^{th} to race against the rest if the Blackhawk Area Council winners. They included several of the Citizenship badges (Community, Nation, World and Society) as well as



Chaplains Message

In the story of Jesus' Transfiguration, Jesus shows something special to the apostles, but not all of them. No, he intentionally selects Peter, James and John for this particular encounter. Why were they singled out for special, insider information that they were instructed not to reveal to the other nine apostles until after Jesus had risen from the dead? This story would have given a boost in prestige to whomever was associated with those three in the early Christian church. But, then Jesus was never particularly interested in our ability to receive human prestige.



This event, known as "The Transfiguration," has long been regarded as one of the most important events in Jesus' life. St. (Pope) John Paul II included it as one of the five Luminous Mysteries of the Holy Rosary, when those mysteries were added to our popular Catholic prayer practice. It is connected in one way or another to many other events in

the stories about Jesus and plays a central theological role because it connects him more explicitly to Moses and Elijah.

Jesus appears here with two other figures: Moses, representing Jewish law and Elijah, representing Jewish prophecy. Moses is important because he was the figure believed to have given the Jews their basic laws and to have significantly contributed to the five books of the Torah, which is the basis of Judaism. Connecting Jesus to Moses thus connects Jesus to the very origins of the Jewish faith. Elijah is important because he was one of the first in a long line of prophets to

remind the leaders and society of God's will for them. As important as both figures are to Salvation History (all faithful Jews in ancient Israel would certainly recognize their importance) it is Jesus who clearly takes center stage in the Transfiguration scene.

This incident is tied with the beginning of Jesus' ministry when he was baptized and a divine voice said, "This is my beloved Son." In that scene, God spoke directly to Jesus. In the Transfiguration scene, God speaks directly to the three apostles about His beloved Son, Jesus, "This is my beloved Son. Listen to Him." The word "listen" recalls God's initial mandate to "hear" the great commandment in Deuteronomy 6:4. So, atop this mountain surrounded by another sacred cloud, Jesus' disciples are led to understand that Jesus is the incarnate law, not another prophet. The abrupt end of the Transfiguration story signals that the high point of God's revelation in Jesus is yet to come.

Jesus' instruction to keep the matter secret until the resurrection indicates that the Transfiguration event (as important as it is) is a mere foretaste of the more fundamental revelation accomplished in Jesus' death and resurrection. So, Peter's tent-building proposal may have been very understandable and well-meaning – but it clearly misses the greater reality. The greater reality for all of us to contemplate is the meaning of Jesus' rising from the dead. The Paschal Mystery – the Life, the Death and the Resurrection – is the goal of our journey through Lent and life!

8 key findings about Catholics and abortion

As the Senate prepares to vote on Amy Coney Barrett's appointment to the U.S. Supreme Court, public attention has focused on her Catholic faith and, in particular, her stance on abortion rights.

Some critics, citing Barrett's <u>past rulings on abortion</u>, have questioned her views on Roe v.Wade, the landmark Supreme Court decision that established a woman's right to abortion. Others have connected Barrett's legal opinions to her embrace of <u>Catholic teachings</u>, which <u>prohibit abortion</u>. During Senate hearings last week, Barrett declined to give specific answers about her stance on Roe v. Wade, saying that she does not have "<u>any agenda</u>." If she is confirmed, Barrett will be the sixth Catholic justice on the court.

In practice, Catholics' views on abortion are <u>not always aligned</u> with the guidance of their church. Like U.S. adults overall, the majority of U.S. Catholics say abortion should be legal – at least in some cases – as do many Catholic legislators and other politicians. Democratic presidential candidate Joe Biden, who often describes himself as a <u>devout Catholic</u>, has said women have a constitutional right to abortion and has <u>vowed to uphold</u> Roe v.Wade, although he has in the past <u>backed curbs on abortion</u>.

Pew Research Center has asked Catholic adults their views on abortion many times over the years, including in a 2019 survey that addressed Roe directly. Here is a compilation of key findings from these surveys.

More than half of U.S. Catholics (56%) said abortion should be legal in all or most cases, while roughly four-in-ten (42%) said it should be illegal in all or most cases, according to the 2019 Pew Research Center survey. Although most Catholics generally approve of legalized abortion, the vast majority favor at least some restrictions. For example, while roughly one-third of Catholics (35%) said abortion should be legal in most cases, only around one-fifth (21%) said it should be legal in all cases. By the same token, 28% of Catholics said abortion should be illegal in most cases, while half as many (14%) said it should be illegal in all cases.

Compared with other Christian groups analyzed in the data, Catholics were about as likely as White Protestants who are not evangelical (60%) and Black Protestants (64%) to support legal abortion, and much more likely than White evangelical Protestants (20%) to do so. Among Americans who are religiously unaffiliated – those who say they are atheist, agnostic or "nothing in particular" – the vast majority (83%) said abortion should be legal in all or most cases.

Catholics who regularly attend Mass show higher levels of opposition to abortion. Two-thirds of Catholics who attend Mass weekly or more often (67%) said abortion should be illegal in all or most cases, while one-in-three (33%) said it should be legal. The ratio is almost exactly reversed for those who attend less frequently: Among Catholics who attend Mass less than weekly, roughly two-thirds said abortion should be legal in all or most cases (65%), while approximately one-in-three (32%) said it should be illegal in all or most cases.

Like Americans overall, Catholics are divided by party on the question of whether abortion should be legal. Most Catholics who identify as Republican or lean toward the Republican Party (63%) said abortion should be illegal in all or most cases, while an even larger share of Catholics who identify as Democrats or lean that way (77%) said abortion should be legal in all or most cases, the 2019 survey showed. Still, roughly one-third of Catholic Republicans (36%)

favored legal abortion, while 17% of Catholic Democrats opposed it, reflecting some dissent within both parties on this issue.

Catholics are about as likely as other Americans to see abortion as a key election issue. Among Catholics, 39% say abortion is "very important" in informing their choice in the 2020 presidential election, as do 38% of U.S. adults overall, according to a survey conducted in July and August of this year. (By comparison, 61% of White evangelical Protestants say abortion is crucial to their vote.) This puts abortion lower on the priority list – for both Catholics and Americans overall – than other key issues such as the economy, health care and the coronavirus outbreak, with majorities in both groups rating these as "very important" to their decision. When it comes to prioritizing Supreme Court appointments as an election issue, Catholics (61%) and U.S. adults overall (57%) again are about equally likely to say it's "very important" to their vote.

Like U.S. adults overall, most Catholics said in the 2019 survey that they oppose overturning Roe v.Wade. Roughly two-thirds of Catholics (68%) said they do not want the Supreme Court to completely overturn the landmark decision, while almost three-in-ten (28%) said the ruling should be overturned. This gap was almost identical to the division in the U.S. public overall (70% vs. 28%). But opinions varied widely by religious affiliation: 89% of unaffiliated Americans said Roe v.Wade should remain in place, compared with only 35% of White evangelical Protestants.

Even though most Catholics said abortion should generally be legal, a majority also said abortion is morally wrong. In fact, the share who said that abortion is morally wrong (57%), according to data from a 2017 survey, and the share who said it should be legal (56%) are almost identical. Among adults in other religious groups, there was a wide range of opinions on this question: Almost two-thirds of Protestants (64%) said abortion is morally wrong, including 77% of those who identify with evangelical Protestant denominations. Among the religiously unaffiliated, the vast majority said abortion is morally acceptable (34%) or not a moral issue (42%).

Summary:

In more recent years, many issues, including prolife and abortion have become political power issues. The above statistics certainly shows the divisions among Catholics along the lines of politics, regions, attendance at mass, and other subject matters. The potential volatility level can be considerable in highly charged political issues.

For ourselves as knights, we are called to engaged in charity, unity, and fraternity. These virtues are apolitical. We are called to a higher level of conduct. As Fr. McCormick helped rise Irish immigrants in New England against the injustices suffered in the late 19th Century, so are we called to take hearts and minds to higher, more faithful and prayerful levels above the many divisive issues facing us in recent years.

Prolife is about embracing people of many different backgrounds, including divisive politics, and extending love and peace in our best possible ways to all. It can be a tall order. In our council, we have opened ourselves to our Hispanic brothers, embraced their culture, language, and understandings in better ways as time passes. This kind of conduct is definitely in keeping with the purposes of our organization and formenting better, wider, and deeper Christian and reach out growth.
