Chaplains Message

This funny story is old, but even if you've heard it before, you might enjoy it again. There was an old couple who argued a lot, and they decided to travel before they died. One place they wanted to see was Israel. While they were there, the wife died. When the husband tried to see what arrangements he could make for her funeral, the mortician told him she could be buried in Israel for \$2,000 or they could send her body home to the United States, but it would cost \$20,000 to transport her. He thought for a moment and said we'll send her to the United States. A friend asked why he would spend so much money to send her back home. He said, "one time a person rose from the dead here in

Israel and I can't take that chance."

Our faith tells us one person did indeed rise from the dead, Jesus Christ, and if it weren't for his resurrection we would never have heard of him. Others have made the claim that they would rise from the dead, but the bottom line is that they didn't. Jesus Christ did and he spent forty days on the earth before his resurrection securing many

very persuasive witnesses. Our faith is based on the incredible testimony of these witnesses (most who gladly gave their lives for their testimony) and the power of the Holy Spirit that has been the life force of our Church since that first Pentecost.

When the resurrected Lord did return he did so in a spirit of peace and offering reconciliation. He did not return with vengeance in his heart. No, he returned with Divine Mercy flowing through his resurrected body. Next Sunday, **April 7**, we invite you to a **Divine Mercy Service at 3:00 PM**. During this service there will be Eucharistic Adoration, some Scripture, a brief reflection, time for

shared and personal prayer, an opportunity for receiving the Sacrament of Reconciliation and an opportunity to venerate the beautiful image of Divine Mercy.

We hope you can join us .

Not only did the risen Lord Jesus promise the gift of the Holy Spirit to lead and guide our Church, he also gave us the gift of His True Presence in the Holy Eucharist, on the night before he died, on Holy Thursday. As we continue our Eucharistic Revival Year, we invite you to our next **Eucharistic Encounter Evening at 7:00 PM**, on Tuesday, **April 16.** During the course of a Eucharistic Holy Hour with Praise and Worship music, your pastor, Fr. Bob Jones, will be giving a couple of brief reflections on a book by Vinny Flynn entitled, "The **Seven Secrets of the Eucharist".** This has been an enriching revival for our parish and we do hope you will be able to attend.

Before the month of April concludes we will have 2 celebrations of First Holy Communion on Saturday, April 20, and 2 celebrations of Confirmation (I in English and I in Spanish) on April 27. Please keep the youth of our parish in your prayers as they plan for these special sacramental moments with their families.

Our Easter Celebration today hopefully gives us a new resolve to praise the Lord. Despite all that is not right in the world and often in our own lives, we do have reason to rejoice and be glad. Jesus Christ has overcome this world and all the darkness that often accompanies it. Jesus Christ has promised a share in His Divine Life and Heavenly Kingdom. From the Desk of the Financial Secretary

Worthy Brothers, greetings! It is an honored privilege to be Financial Secretary of this great Council! Like so many "volunteer" positions in life, this one is truly blessed with so, so, so, so many opportunities to do stuff!! LOL! But having been a close friend



with the late great FS Dick Campobello for many years, and then Steve Haugh following him, I had a good idea of the work involved. Then Mark Allen filled the gap with Steve's sudden passing, no small feat. But it really is a rewarding job. You work closely with the other Officers all the time, not just an hour or so at a couple of meetings each month, but all the time preparwhat IS the next thing... Obviously my part deals with the

finances, but there are so many moving pieces to all that is done. It is amazing to watch the thought process, the old wheels turning, of the GK as ideas and plans are formulated, watching the DKG delve into it and see what part he needs to take, and Treasurer taking the steps to see not only what money is needed, but where is it and does something need to be transferred by him before we even realize it needs to be done! Each of the other Officers thinks about what they need to do, or with many of them, what ELSE they can do. If anything is apparent, it is how many of them overextend themselves because there is something that needs to be done, but mostly that SOMEONE must do it and they each say..."well, if nobody else is, guess I better!" That makes Fr. McCormick Council so vibrant, always did, is, and always will! But if you are reading this, I ask you to stop, and think are you pulling your weight? We always say when recruiting, you do not have to do ANYTHING, just support us... well, true to a point, but help is always needed... even an hour doing this or that contributes to the sum of the whole, without which there is nothing. So just a little asking on my part, do you have an hour?

Okay, here is where I drop the other foot... death and taxes... We do have taxes; they are called dues. Our Supreme office and our State Council have taxes... they call them assessments. For every member on the roster, we must pay a tax to Caesar. If you do not pay your dues, I still must spend money in your name to pay those taxes. Pro-Life Report

The Holy Father, Pope John Paul II, reaches out lovingly and compassionately to women who have had an abortion in his encyclical letter *Evangelium Vitae* (EV), the Gospel of Life. While condemning abortion as "an unspeakable crime," he acknowledges that "the decision to have an abortion is often tragic and painful for the mother..." (EV, 58).

The Holy Father understands that many factors influence the decision a woman makes when she is burdened with an untimely pregnancy:

As well as the mother, there are often other people too who decide upon the death of the child in the womb. In the first place, the father of the child may be to blame, not only when he directly pressures the woman to have an abortion, but also when he indirectly encourages such a decision on her part by leaving her alone to face the problems of pregnancy. ... Nor can one overlook the pressures which sometimes come from the wider family circle and from friends. Sometimes the woman is subjected to such strong pressure that she feels psychologically forced to have an abortion: certainly in this case the moral responsibility lies particularly with those who have directly or indirectly obliged her to have an abortion. (EV, 59)

The Holy Father also places responsibility for the tragedy of abortion on "doctors and nurses ... when they place at the service of death skills which were acquired for promotion of life," on "legislators who have promoted and approved abortion laws," and, "to the extent that they have a say in the matter, on the administrators of the health-care centers where abortions are performed" (EV, 59).

A general and no less serious responsibility [John Paul II continues] lies with those who have encouraged the spread of an attitude of sexual permissiveness and a lack of esteem for motherhood, and those who should have ensured—but did not— effective family and social policies in support of families. (EV, 59) "Finally," he concludes, "one cannot overlook the network of complicity which reaches out to include international institutions, foundations and associations which systematically campaign for the legalization and spread of abortion in the world" (EV, 59). A woman's decision to have an abortion is made in the context of multiple personal and societal pressures in what the Pope has termed the rapidly accelerating "culture of death." Although the responsibility for the abortion decision is not entirely, nor perhaps not even primarily hers, she must bear its burdensome consequences almost entirely alone for the rest of her life. The Holy Father's pastoral outreach to women who have had an abortion is tenderly compassionate, forgiving and hopeful in the Gospel of Life.

I would like to say a special word to women who have had an abortion. The Church is aware of the many factors which may have influenced your decision, and she does not doubt that in many cases it was a painful and even shattering decision. (EV, 99)

A woman's decision to have an abortion is always a stressful decision, made under the pressure of time and often shrouded in secrecy and shame. Most abortions occur in the first trimester—only a few weeks or a few days after medical confirmation of the pregnancy. Women are urged to complete the "procedure" quickly, and are erroneously assured that what is to be removed is only "a blob of cells," "some tissue," or a "pre-embryo." Yet, every woman knows that if nothing untoward intervenes, in a matter of months she would be holding a child in her arms.

She may believe that the birth of this child would threaten her relationship with the baby's father, or her ability to complete her education or to achieve her career plans. She may be under intense pressure from the baby's father, from her own parents and from friends to submit to an abortion. Conversely she may find herself alone, unable to share the secret of her pregnancy with anyone—afraid of losing their esteem and their love, or for fear of reproach or abandon-

ment

Often women present themselves for an abortion in obvious distress, tearfully signing forms they do not read, feeling emotionally numb and depersonalized. They get through the procedure as though it were happening to someone else, and parrot the rhetoric of the abortion industry when interviewed shortly thereafter: they are "relieved"; their "problem is solved"; they can now "get on with life" as though nothing more significant than a tooth extraction had occurred.

In the days and weeks following an abortion a woman's defensive denial may be shattered, as pain and bleeding and emotional lability due to hormonal changes remind her of the assault on her body. She is poignantly reminded of the reality of what has happened—of her child that has died an untimely and violent death—as the date approaches when the baby would have been born, or when she sees other children the age her child would have been, or on the anniversary of her abortion, or on Mother's Day, or by the omni-present abortion debate in the media, or on hearing a pro-life homily at church. Flashbacks to the abortion procedure may occur at every visit to the gynecologist, or be triggered by the sound of the suction machine at the dentist's office or the vacuum cleaner at home, or by watching a violent film or TV news story. Graphic educational materials about prenatal development or about late-term abortion may suddenly bring the scientific truth about what has happened into clear focus, leading to overwhelming guilt and depression.

The wound in your heart may not yet have healed. (EV, 99)

Women who have had abortions are often haunted by the intrusive thought, "I killed my baby!" Nightmares of babies being sucked down a tube in pieces, or of themselves causing fatal accidents to children, make them fear sleep. Daytime flashbacks and intrusive thoughts interfere with work, study and personal relationships. They may turn to alcohol or drugs to get to sleep at night or to deaden the pain of their waking hours, or throw themselves into feverish activity in an attempt to forget their sorrow, guilt and shame. Deep feelings of loneliness and emptiness may lead to binge eating, alternating with purging and anorexia, or intense efforts to repair intimate relationships or develop new ones inappropriately, or to an insatiable need to replace the lost child at any cost.

For some women the painful wound is due to a shattered sense of self. She may have always thought of herself as a good person—successful and admired at home, at school and at work. She may never have experienced a major failure, never made a serious mistake in life. She may be a product of an environment which applauds beauty, thinness, athletic and academic accomplishments, financial success and personal autonomy above all else. An untimely pregnancy may overwhelm her because it threatens to destroy her universe, and seemingly make it impossible for her to fulfill her expectations for success (and the expectations which others have for her). Abortion presents itself as an obvious, quick and easy solution to her "problem." However, the horror of what is happening may become apparent to her even as the abortion is taking place. She may panic at the realization of what she has done: "How could I have done something like that!?" The person she sees in the mirror is not the person she has known. Never having experienced unconditional love, never having had any experience of failure or any perceived need for forgiveness, she may be unable to accept her wounded self as real, to forgive herself or to ask for forgiveness.

The concept of a loving, merciful God presented by the Holy Father may be entirely foreign to a woman whose sense of self has been destroyed by abortion, and initially difficult to understand and to believe. Yet, if she encounters the personification of this truly Christian love and esteem in priests, counselors, and fellow Catholic lay persons, this may be the beginning of her healing and a new stage in her development as a person and as a Christian.

MARCH 2023 SUPREME CHAPLAIN'S MONTHLY CHALLENGE But Jesus came and touched them, saying, "Rise, and do not be afraid." (Gospel for March 5, Mt 17:7)

"Do not be afraid" — we read these words often in Scripture. Here, Jesus speaks to the apostles, awestruck at his Transfiguration. In a similar way, the angel told St. Joseph, "Do not be afraid" to take Mary, who had conceived the Christ Child, as his wife. The knowledge that God is with us should encourage and strengthen us. Sometimes, as with the apostles, we are overwhelmed by the mysteries of faith; at other times the challenges of living our faith in a secular culture seem daunting. Yet Christ continually empowers us as he calls us: "Rise, and do not be afraid."

The tradition of **blessing Easter food** has its roots in both the **Roman Catholic** and **Orthodox Christian** churches. Let's explore the origins of this meaningful practice:

Historical Context:

The tradition dates back centuries and is deeply intertwined with the celebration of **Easter**, which commemorates the resurrection of Jesus Christ.

In medieval Europe, people would bring baskets of food to church on Holy Saturday (the day before Easter) to have them blessed by the priest. These baskets contained a variety of foods, symbolizing different aspects of the Easter story.

Symbolism and Significance:

Paska (Easter Bread): The round paska, often adorned with intricate dough ornaments, represents the risen Christ. It is the centerpiece of the Easter basket.

The blessing sanctifies the food, making it spiritually nourishing for the faithful.

After the blessing, families take the food home and share it as part of their Easter meal.
