of money, as well as camaraderie). However when doing these meals we may only be "netting" \$1.50-\$2.50 per meal, so if we provide workers with a meal we actually lose money. If we give away a meal, we need to sell 4-5 meals just to break even on the one meal we give away. That being said we do not want anybody who may be in any form of distress going without, so please inform myself (confidentially) and all will be taken care of. Monthly breakfast, as well as the annual St. Pats., and Polish dinners excluded. If you should have any question, or concerns with this please feel free to contact myself and we can discuss. Also, to help us better track the number of hours that our Council spends doing the works of Charity we will start to have sign up sheets for events to better report to the state, and supreme offices a more accurate tally of worker hours for all events.

In closing I would like to thank you all for allowing me to be the Grand Knight (for another year) of this awesome Council, in this truly magnificent Parish, it is my honor, and privilege to serve you all, I have also found it to be tremendously rewarding. Next month I will give what I will refer to as a "State of the Council" report, with more of our plans for this new year. Knights Of Columbus Council Officers' Duties

GRAND KNIGHT: The grand knight is responsible for the welfare of the council. He presides over council meetings, acts as an ex-officio member of all committees, appoints a membership and programming director, convenes officers for a monthly meeting, and ensures all necessary reports are submitted to the state and Supreme Council. He should also be aware of the council's financial status and ensure that his signature appears on all checks drawn. The grand knight is a member of the Advisory Board with general supervision of the council's Columbian Squire circle.

CHAPLAIN: The chaplain is the spiritual advisor of the council. He is expected to make a report at council meetings on religious matters. The grand knight appoints a priest in accordance with any rules established by the bishop of the diocese to serve as council chaplain.

DEPUTY GRAND KNIGHT: The deputy grand knight is second in command. He assists the grand knight with council affairs and fulfills all duties assigned to him by the grand knight. Should the grand knight be absent from a council meeting, the deputy grand knight will preside. He is chairman of the council's retention committee and also a member of the Advisory Board charged with overseeing the council's sponsored Columbian Squires circle.

CHANCELLOR: The chancellor has a variety of responsibilities. Primarily, he assists the grand knight and the deputy grand knight in the execution of their duties and oversees the council in both their absences. He is charged with strengthening the members' interests in council activities. The chancellor is chairman of the admission committee and a member of the Columbian Squires circle ceremonial team.

RECORDER: The recorder is similar to a court reporter or a secretary. He is responsible for maintaining a true record of all actions of the council and its correspondence.

FINANCE SECRETARY; The financial secretary is appointed by the Supreme Knight, upon recommendation of the council. His main area of responsibilities is maintaining all financial and membership records. He collects and receives all moneys from all sources, including annual dues from council members. He also handles supply orders for the council officers and members, filing the Report of Officer (#185), and submitting all membership transactions to the Supreme Council.

TREASURER: The treasurer is responsible for the safe-keeping and maintaining records of all council funds and accounts. He is responsible for depositing money into the council's accounts and provides a certificate of such monies to the grand knight. He is also responsible for payment of all expenses.

LECTOR: The lecturer is appointed by the grand knight to provide both educational and entertaining programs to the council. He is responsible for the 'Good of the Order' portion of council meetings. In order to provide members with informative and educational programs, he must be knowledgeable and aware of all council programming.

ADVOCATE: The advocate is the legal representative of the council and serves as the council's attorney at trials and investigations of any interest to the council. While he does not need to be a member of the legal profession, he should be familiar with the council by-laws, the Order's Charter, Constitution and Laws, Methods of Conducting a Council Meeting, and Robert's Rules of Order.

WARDEN: The warden is the 'watchdog' for council property and degree paraphernalia, except the property of the financial secretary, treasurer and recorder. He is also responsible for setting up the council chambers for meetings and ceremonial work. During ceremonial exemplifications, he will appoint and supervise guards.

INSIDE & OUTSIDE GUARDS: The guards have similar responsibilities, but distinct differences. The outside guard tends to the outer door admitting visitors and members to the inner door. Once at the inner door, the inside guard checks to make sure that their membership cards are current.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES: The board of trustees consists of three members elected by the council and the grand knight, who serves as chairman of the board. They oversee the work of the financial secretary and treasurer, and with the deputy grand knight serve on the council's retention committee. During council elections, only the three-year trustee is voted on, with the others moving on to become two-and one-year trustees, respectively.

Cub Scouts is changing. Beginning with the new Scout year in September, there will be changes afoot that will help Cub Scouts be more prepared to move into Boy Scouts. Gone are the beads, badges, belt loops, arrow points and other bling the scouts would earn. In their place will be a new format that each rank will follow to earn their rank. There will be seven adventures that need to be completed to achieve rank and there will still be Bobcats, Tigers, Wolves, Bears, Webelos and lastly, the Arrow of Light.

The first three ranks (Tiger, Wolf and Bear) will have 6 of seven adventures that will be required with the seventh one as an elective. As they complete an adventure, they will receive an adventure loop to signify their success. Webelos will have five required adventures with two electives. Arrow of Light will have four required and three elective adventures. These two ranks will receive adventure pins upon successful completion.

As part of the revised Cub Scout program, the Cub Scout Promise and the Law of the Pack have been retired, and the boys will learn the Scout Oath and Scout Law. This change will solidify the unity of the Scouting movement and help Cub Scouting to live out the mission and vision statements of Scouting that are referred to therein.

Cub Scouts will also have Ethan as their guide through their adventures. Ethan will be a year or two older than the scout using the handbooks (which have all been rewritten) of their ranks. He will offer tips and his experiences with Scouting to help the boys understand the struggles that can come along the way. He may not always do it right the first time but he remembers to have some fun along the way and encourages the Scouts to do the same.



All in all, this redesign of the Cub Scout program has five desired outcomes.

Muscular Dystrophy Summer Camp

I wanted thank Council 3880 for sponsoring a golf hole at the Association of Horizon recent fundraising golf outing. “Camp”, is our family of people who gather one week a year happens at the Easter Seals owned Timber Pointe Outdoor Centre in Hudson, IL, just 15 minutes north of Bloomington-Normal, on Lake Bloomington. We provide a one-week summer camp vacation for up to 117 campers.

Campers are physically disabled adults with Muscular Dystrophy, Each camper is paired up with an able-bodied volunteer for the week. As I write this, we need 17 male volunteers 16 years or older. There is no cost to campers or volunteers to attend. If someone has a Boy Scout, I am the Disabilities Awareness Merit Badge Councilor. If you know someone who needs up to 144 hours of community service for school graduation requirements or similar, the time as Camp counts...6 days x 24 hours a day.

This is communal cabin living. We set up Camp Saturday 7/18 12-noon. Sunday 7/19 - volunteers arrive 8am, campers arrive 2pm. Monday 7/20 through Friday 7/24 - Camp activities from 7:30am breakfast to cookout at 9pm.

Friday 7/24 is the official “visitors day”. However, if any contingent of the Council would like to visit Camp during the week, you’re more than welcome to come down any day of the week. It’s a 3 hour drive, breakfast at 8, lunch at noon and dinner at 5. See our new wheelchair swings. Maybe there’s a parishioner, neighbor or relative you know with a physical disability. They get the vacation, the family gets valuable respite. We draw campers and volunteers primarily from the Chicago area in addition to central and northern Illinois.

This is a 100% all-volunteer effort. It costs us up to \$450 per individual to operate Camp. You do the math.

Saturday 7/25, we break Camp. Departures begin 8am. We have to be off property by 12 noon.

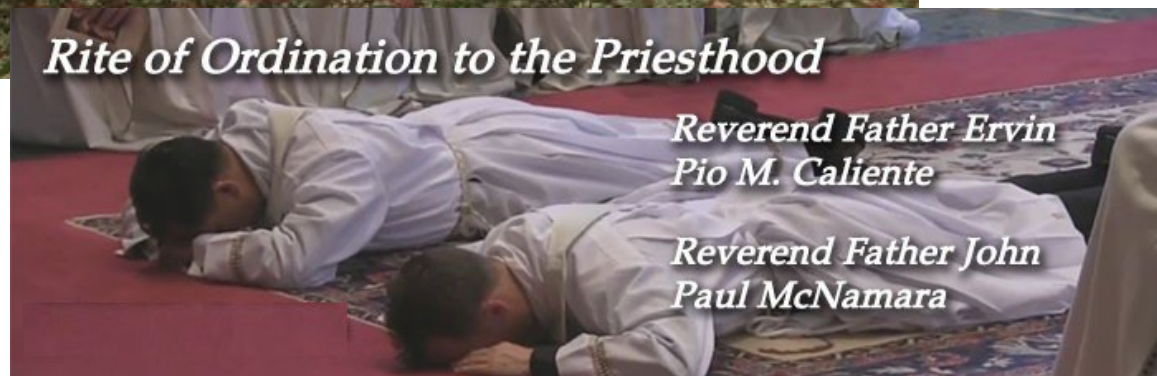

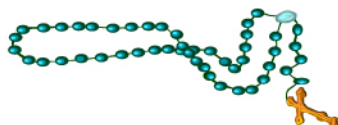
